

GCMS WORKS TIRELESSLY FOR YOU

This month I will be inaugurated as the President of the Genesee County Medical Society. I want to thank the Medical Society for having the confidence in my leadership abilities to select me for this prestigious position. I only hope that I will be worthy of the trust placed in me as I follow the long line of dedicated presidents, including outgoing President, Pino Colone, MD, who have preceded me.

The past year has been one that has truly tested the resolve and the leadership role that the Genesee County Medical Society has played

in dealing with the myriad of medical issues affecting the health of the county's population and the Medical Society's advocacy on behalf of it members and their patients.

The past two years found the GCMS fully engaged with the ongoing lead-related Flint Water Crisis, the Legionella outbreak and most recently the Shigellosis cases occurring in the county. These issues remain at the forefront and will continue to be the priorities that I and the Medical Society will continue to address.

This community has been barraged by a multitude of state and federal agencies with their interventions and recommendations for addressing the health crisis that has so adversely affected this community. Their interests and interventions, while appreciated, must be accessed and evaluated with the best interest of the community being paramount. This scrutiny for efficacy, which will continue, is a role embraced by the Medical Society.

The Medical Society will continue its tireless work to improve health care outcomes. This includes its collaboration with the Greater Flint Health Coalition and the Genesee County Free Medical Clinic. The Society has a robust committee structure which works behind the scenes to share ideas, address community resources, and provide opportunities to address the

state of medicine locally in our community.

However, to continue to function as a highly effective, premier medical society speaking to the needs of both our professional colleagues and the patients we serve, we must address the financial viability of the GCMS. Presently, the overall financial status is precariously close to the point that the Medical Society will no longer be able to maintain its levels of advocacy for our members and patients. Prior sources of income to the Medical Society are no longer available. Membership in the Medical

Society has declined enough to impact viability, while membership dues have not been increased since 1990. Staff reductions have been made to the extent that further reductions will preclude the Medical Society's ability to function at its current level. In the short term, the Medical Society has just been awarded a contract with Wayne State University to study the Legionnaires disease outbreak in the county. This will allow some ease financially over the next year. The long-term financial ability has to be given the highest priority. The Medical Society Foundation has embarked on an ambitious Capital Campaign to raise two million dollars. To this end, members are encouraged to make contributions to the Medical Society Foundation and assist the Medical Society in identifying potential major donors who are willing to also give to the Foundation. We will continue our efforts to recruit new members and to have former members reinstate their membership.

I am optimistic that the GCMS will remain the vibrant county society of stellar reputation that it has had for many years. I will commit to you that my greatest effort will be to maintain this reputation by doing all that I can to restore the financial stability that is essential for this to occur.



JOHN HEBERT, III, MD

If you are looking for John Hebert, III, MD after hours, you may find him feeding pasta to his koi fish in the pond he made to house them, or thinking fondly about his grandchildren while listening to country music.

Dr. John Hebert was born in Albuquerque, New Mexico. He graduated from the University of New Mexico with a bachelor's degree. He attended Meharry Medical College in Nashville, and he completed his residency training at Hurley Medical Center. Dr. Hebert then entered the United States Army as a major and was stationed in Germany. He is a fellow of the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists and he is board certified by the American Board of Obstetrics and Gynecology. He is also certified by the American Board of Quality Assessment and Utilization Review Physicians. Dr. Hebert chaired the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at Hurley Medical Center from 1985-2011. He has served as the OB/GYN Program Director of the Hurley Medical Center/Michigan State University College of Human Medicine since 1998. He holds the rank of Associate Professor of OB/GYN at the MSU College of Human Medicine.

Dr. Hebert 's passion is medical education, both graduate, and

undergraduate. He is the recipient of numerous Hurley and Michigan State University outstanding teacher awards. He is a past recipient of the Council on Resident Education in Obstetrics & Gynecology National Faculty Award and the Association of Professors of Gynecology & Obstetrics Medical Education Foundation Excellence in Teaching Award. He is a recipient of the Pinnacle Award, Hurley's highest honor awarded to its physicians. In 2013, the John Hebert, III, MD, Distinguished Faculty Service Award was established. It is given in recognition of superior accomplishments in medical research, teaching excellence, scholarship and or mentorship within the Hurley Medical Center Obstetrics & Gynecology Residency Program. In May 2016, Dr. Hebert was the recipient of the Outstanding Community Faculty Award given by the MSU College of Human Medicine.

Dr. Hebert loves teaching residents. To him, they are almost like his own children, and they affectionately call him "boss." He has taught over 500 OB/GYN students and 70 OB/GYN residents since he became Program Director. Under his leadership, the program has doubled in size. He is especially proud of the fact that, in the past nine years, only one resident has





not passed his board exams on the first try! He loves to follow his residents' successes. Dr. Hebert still delivers babies with his residents, and also takes the regular call.

Dr. Hebert 's community interests have included serving on the Board of Directors of the Flint Urban League, as Past President of the Flint Rotary Club, and former President of the Board of Directors of Planned Parenthood of Michigan, as well as the African-American Physicians Association of Genesee County. He is a member of Alpha Phi Alpha and Sigma Pi Phi fraternities.

Dr. Hebert and his wife Nelda met at Meharry Medical School and have been married for 43 years. Dr. Hebert has nine siblings. He and Nelda are the proud parents of four children and grandparents of four grandchildren; they especially enjoy spoiling the grandchildren. Daughter, Nichole Hebert-Graham is a lawyer. She has two children. Her husband, Corey, is a physician. Daughter, Tiffany Hebert, is a pathologist. She has two children and is married to Nathan, an attorney. Son, Sean Hebert, works for a manufacturing company in Grand Blanc. Son, Brian Hebert, teaches English in Hong Kong.

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

Flint receives primary care Health Professional Shortage Area designation

LANSING, Mich. - Primary care services in Flint, Michigan will be strengthened through a federal Health Professional Shortage Area (HPSA) designation that makes the area eligible for primary care workforce recruitment and retention programs.

"This designation helps ensure that Flint residents are able to receive the health care services they need by helping health care providers recruit primary care doctors, nurse practitioners, and physician assistants to continue practicing in underserved areas," said Nick Lyon, director of the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services. "With improved access to care, Flint residents will have more opportunities to see positive health outcomes today and in the future."

The MDHHS requested a HPSA designation for Flint by submitting data demonstrating a shortage of primary medical care providers. After review by the Health Resources and Services Agency within the United State Department of Health and Human Services, portions of Flint received a Primary Care HPSA designation effective August 27, 2016.

Health facilities located within the designated area are able to utilize programs designed to improve access to primary care by recruiting and retaining providers in areas with HPSA designations. These initiatives include the National Health Service Corps Loan Repayment and State Loan Repayment which pay off medical education debt for providers practicing in HPSA designated areas, as well as the International Medical Graduate Program which assists international medical graduates working in HPSA designated areas.

There are three types of HPSA designations: primary care, dental, and mental health. In addition to the primary care HPSA, all of Flint is located within a mental health HPSA and portions are located within a dental health HPSA. HRSA is the primary federal agency for enhancing access to health care for people who are uninsured, isolated or medically vulnerable.

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OCTOBER LEGISLATIVE LIAISON COMMITTEE MEETING

On October 3, 2016, the Legislative Liaison Committee met with Senator Dave Robertson, Clyde Edwards from Representative Neely's office, Nichole Derusha Mackey from Representative Pam Faris' office, and Jo Neller of the Michigan State Medical Society. Also in attendance were two residents, Drs. Kewan Hadid and Rahul Gupta.

The Committee reviewed the current situation with Senate Bill 1019 certified registered nurse anesthetist scope of practice expansion. This bill has passed the Senate; it now is in the House. MSMS is opposed. The Committee discussed at length the difficulties with expansion of scope for nurse anesthetists.

The Committee also reviewed House bill 5400, which would slightly change how advanced practice nurses currently function. Due to changes in the legislation, MSMS is taking a neutral position on this legislation.

Senate bill 647 and House bill 5160 relate to CPR and AED's in schools. It requires a curriculum of training. This was discussed by the Committee.

The Michigan Automated Prescription System (MAPS) was discussed at length. The need for upgrades, and timing of the upgrades was the source of significant conversation.

The next meeting of the Committee will take place on December 5th. Members wishing to attend are encouraged to do so, you may call the GCMS offices at any time to reserve.

Pete Levine reported that the press release approved by the GCMS Executive Committee was issued and it struck a major chord in the community.

B) Finance

Budget to Actual Report for Period ending July 31, 2016

Dr. John Waters noted the key elements of the financial situation. The organization needs sponsorships for meetings, advertising in Bulletins, and donations to the Foundation. He said the Foundation goal of \$2 million is not being met.

Dr. Waters noted that the building is cash flow positive. The diminution of outside funding of the Medical Society has impacted the organization dramatically as has 30 years of inflation without a dues increase. He noted that the work of the Medical Society benefits all physicians, but not all are willing to join.

US Surgeon General's visit on August 15th

Dr. Hebert also reported that the US Surgeon General Dr. Vivek Murthy came to Flint again on August 15th. The Medical Society put a meeting together which had over 200 attendees. Drs. Mukkamala and Kulkarni donated lunch for the meeting attendees.

Skin Rash Report Press Conference

The skin rash press conference was held earlier in the week. It featured Dr. Walter Barkey. Dr. Soderstrom reviewed the skin rash report produced by federal agencies with significant input by Dr. Barkey. The Board was extremely complimentary of Dr. Barkey's work on this project.

F.) Other Business

AMA request to hold Focus Groups.

Dr. Bobby Mukkamala reported that on the AMA has requested that GCMS work with them to develop a joint program which would involve interviews with physicians in private practice settings. After a day of those interviews, AMA would be willing to put on an evening education program on.

Motion: that GCMS participate with the AMA on a joint program in February with an evening meeting focusing on MACRA. The motion carried.

Update on Maintenance of Certification

Pennsylvania Medical Society President's Letter of June 20, 2016

Dr. Venkat Rao provided an in-depth look at the Pennsylvania Medical Society's work proposing that mandatory recertification as criteria for medical staff or insurance company privileges be ended. He explained the finances of the American Board of Medical Specialties and the way the Board of Medical Specialties generates revenues. He noted that the Pennsylvania Medical Society took a noconfidence vote relating to the American Board of Medical Specialties. His suggestion is that GCMS join the Pennsylvania Medical Society in expressing no-confidence in the American Board of Medical Specialties and to ask MSMS to join the Pennsylvania Medical Society in voting no-confidence in the American Board of Medical Specialties. And to ask that MSMS join the Pennsylvania Medical Society in its efforts to stop mandatory maintenance of certification by the American Board of Medical Specialties.

Genesee County Medical Society Board of Directors August 23, 2016 - Minutes

Resolution:

"the Board of the Genesee County Medical Society has voted a position of no-confidence in the leadership of the Board of the American Board of Internal Medicine. Genesee County Medical Society believes that the current leadership of the American Board of Internal is not capable of reforming the process of maintenance of certification in an academically meaningful and fiscally responsible way. The Board of Directors also requests that MSMS join the Genesee County Medical Society and the Pennsylvania Medical Society in its expression of no-confidence in the leadership of the Board of the American Board of Internal Medicine". Approved by the GCMS Board of Directors on August 23, 2016.

Motion:

that the Genesee County Medical Society send letters to Hurley Medical Center and Genesys Regional Medical Center asking them to cease the use of maintenance of certification as a requirement for credentialing at the hospital. The motion carried.

Other Business

Motion: that the Medical Society cosponsor the mindfulness session with the Crim and the Greater Flint Health Coalition, to be held on October 5. The motion carried.

G.) Adjournment

No further business appearing, the meeting was adjourned at 8:15pm.

Section 1557: Anti-Discrimination Obligations

Section 1557 of the Affordable Care Act and related regulations prohibit discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, age, or disability in health programs or activities that receive federal assistance. While the final ruling is inclusive of existing federal civil rights laws, there are some new provisions including posting requirements that require attention and action by physicians.

Action Required:

Physicians accepting Federal financial assistance from the US Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) including, but not limited to, payment under any Medicare Part A, C, and D plan or Medicaid must comply with the provisions under Section 1557 including the following (as posted in Medigram on September 9 and 23, 2016):

Effective July 18, 2016, physicians must:

- Post a nondiscrimination notice in the office and on the practice website. A sample is available at http://www.hhs. gov/civil-rights/for-individuals/section-1557/translated-resources/index.html.
- Post "taglines" in their office and on their practice website indicating that language assistance services are available free of charge.

Taglines must be made available in the 15 most common languages spoken in Michigan. Translated sample taglines can be found at http://www.hhs.gov/civil-rights/for-individuals/section-1557/translated-resources/index.html. You will only need to add the correct phone number.

The top 15 non-English languages for Michigan are: Spanish, Arabic, Chinese, Syriac, Vietnamese, Albanian, Korean,

- Bengali, Polish, German, Italian, Japanese, Russian, Serbo-Croation, and Tagalog.
- Arrange for translator services or make other reasonable accommodations if necessary and requested. Some health plans you contract with arrange for these services at no charge. You should contact the health plans you contract with to inquire if services are available. If a translator service is necessary, you will be responsible for any associated costs and may not bill the patient. Other reasonable accommodations that may be appropriate in certain situations include remote or other electronic translation and preprinted written translations.
- Print the 15 taglines on any of your significant publications and communications. On smaller items such as postcards and brochures you may print just Spanish and Arabic. You may first use up existing stock of pre-printed publications.

The enforcement date for the posting provisions is **October 17**, **2016**. Physician practices with 15 or more employees are required to have a grievance procedure and a designated compliance coordinator. Training materials, a model grievance procedure, and frequently asked questions are available on the HHS Office of Civil Rights website (http://www.hhs.gov/civil-rights/for-individuals/section-1557).
