#### **President's Message**

#### Physician Advocacy - Help the patient and in turn treat the disease.

"The good physician treats the disease; the great physician treats the patient who has the disease."

-William Osler

#### Advocacy - what is it?

As physicians, we often find ourselves at the crossroads of a unique and sometimes intimate knowledge of patient needs, intersecting with the ability to leverage influence to change health care system delivery, social barriers, and even impact political policy. It is incumbent on physicians to be very familiar with the concept of seeing patient needs beyond a biomedical model and incorporating social factors of health into patient care, which forms the foundation of being an advocate. These factors may include education, income and employment, social support and housing, as well as early childhood experiences.

#### Is physician advocacy important?

On an individual basis, the precursors of advocacy must first involve establishing a patient-provider relationship wherein the needs of the patient are understood and heard, followed by taking additional steps to ensure a patient receives the services they need to recover and thrive in society. It is essential to have the humility to recognize that many physicians come from a background of relative privilege, and thus may not be able to directly relate to how a person without social privilege experiences illness or need. Being educated professionals, physicians ought to be reflective, self-aware, and cautious in assuming they know or understand the socially disadvantaged patient's priorities which is very important in the communities we serve.

#### What are the barriers to physician advocacy?

An important first barrier to having engaged physician advocates is the selection criteria of medical schools traditionally placing heavy emphasis on biomedical knowledge and predictors of achievement as a medical expert. If our medical communities and training institutions place a high value on advocacy, pre-medical school experiences that highlight awareness of social justice issues and a desire to intervene will be increasingly considered.

Traditionally, advocacy was something observed in predecessor physicians who were notable role models as advocates, then subsequent physicians began to experience and hone similar behaviors as independent practitioners. In more recent years, there is an increasing emphasis on service learning: engaging undergraduate medical students in community-based, hands-on projects to understand and become involved with social and societal health needs.

#### How can we foster the skills of physician advocates?

With the assumption that there is consensus that advocacy is an essential skill for physicians and as such should be thoughtfully and specifically taught throughout medical training, the task becomes how to build an educational framework. We must begin by selecting future colleagues that have an interest in, and hopefully a passion for, the role of physician as advocate. Both trainees and "accomplished" physician advocates must constantly and humbly return to the person or group we are advocating with to ensure our priorities align and that we are indeed working alongside. This will require the ability to establish excellent therapeutic relationships built on trust, listening, and understanding. The ability to liaise with community organizations that do not necessarily have biomedical outcomes as their primary goal ought to be encouraged and modelled early during the formative training of future doctors.

Despite its diverse and broad definition, physicians often intuitively know when advocacy is required and that it is integrally important to the health of the individual and in caring for the greater community. Acquisition of advocacy skills is complex, longitudinal, inter-relational, and collaborative. The nature of the activity will necessarily mean it is harder to define, quantify, and assess than other traditional physician skills such as scholarship and technical medical expertise; hence, curricula are diverse and in evolution. Lastly, and perhaps most importantly, advocates must approach each patient as an individual and with a great deal of humility. Perception of need and how best to advocate is a lifelong challenge, which even the accomplished clinician advocate will find humbling and instructive.

Hope this resonates with you and your willingness to become a "true" patient advocate.





#### **DEA Extends Telehealth Flexibilities**

The ability to prescribe controlled substances based on telehealth patient visits was set to expire when the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency ends on Thursday, May 11<sup>th</sup>. The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) initially issued two proposed rules establishing new policies for controlled substance prescriptions based on telehealth visits, one for buprenorphine and one for other controlled substances. The AMA weighed in on the policy with multiple arms of the Biden administration, including the DEA as well as Rahul Gupta, MD, the Director of the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy. After receiving more than 38,000 comment letters, however, the DEA has decided to extend the same policies that have been in place during COVID for an additional 6 months, until November 11, 2023. The AMA has issued a statement welcoming this extension.

#### DEA Registered-Practitioners

#### Dear Registrants:

On December 29, 2022, the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023 enacted a new **one-time**, eight-hour training requirement for all Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA)-registered practitioners on the treatment and management of patients with opioid or other substance use disorders. Below is information on this new requirement.

#### Who is responsible for satisfying this new training requirement?

 All DEA-registered practitioners, with the exception of practitioners that are solely veterinarians.

#### How will practitioners be asked to report satisfying this new training requirement?

 Beginning on June 27, 2023, practitioners will be required to check a box on their online DEA registration form—regardless of whether a registrant is completing their initial registration application or renewing their registration—affirming that they have completed the new training requirement.

#### What is the deadline for satisfying this new training requirement?

- The deadline for satisfying this new training requirement is the date of a practitioner's next scheduled DEA registration submission—regardless of whether it is an initial registration or a renewal registration—on or after June 27, 2023.
- This one-time training requirement affirmation will not be a part of future registration renewals.

#### How can practitioners satisfy this new training requirement?

There are multiple ways that practitioners can satisfy this new training requirement.

- First, the following groups of practitioners are deemed to have satisfied this training:
  - Group 1: All practitioners that are board certified in addiction medicine or addiction
    psychiatry from the American Board of Medical Specialties, the American Board of
    Addiction Medicine, or the American Osteopathic Association.
  - 2. Group 2: All practitioners that graduated in good standing from a medical (allopathic or osteopathic), dental, physician assistant, or advanced practice nursing school in the United States within five years of June 27, 2023, and successfully completed a comprehensive curriculum that included at least eight hours of training on:

- Treating and managing patients with opioid or other substance use disorders, including the appropriate clinical use of all drugs approved by the Food and Drug Administration for the treatment of a substance use disorder; or
- Safe pharmacological management of dental pain and screening, brief intervention, and referral for appropriate treatment of patients with or at risk of developing opioid and other substance use disorders.
- Second, practitioners can satisfy this training by engaging in a total of eight hours of training
  on treatment and management of patients with opioid or other substance use disorders from
  the groups listed below. A few key points related to this training:
  - The training does not have to occur in one session. It can be cumulative across
    multiple sessions that equal eight hours of training.
  - 2. Past trainings on the treatment and management of patients with opioid or other substance use disorders can count towards a practitioner meeting this requirement. In other words, if you received a relevant training from one of the groups listed below—prior to the enactment of this new training obligation on December 29, 2022—that training counts towards the eight-hour requirement.
  - Past DATA-Waived trainings count towards a DEA registrant's 8-hour training requirement.
  - Trainings can occur in a variety of formats, including classroom settings, seminars at professional society meetings, or virtual offerings.

#### What accredited groups may provide trainings that meet this new requirement?


- The American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM)
- The American Academy of Addiction Psychiatry (AAAP)
- American Medical Association (AMA)
- The American Osteopathic Association (AOA), or any organizations accredited by the AOA to provide continuing medical education
- The American Dental Association (ADA)
- The American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons (AAOMS)
- The American Psychiatric Association (APA)
- The American Association of Nurse Practitioners (AANP)
- The American Academy of Physician Associates (AAPA)
- The American Nurses Credentialing Center (ANCC)
- Any other organization accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education (AACCME) or the Commission for Continuing Education Provider Recognition (CCEPR), whether directly or through an organization accredited by a State medical society that is recognized by the ACCME or CCEPR
- Any other organization approved or accredited by the Assistant Secretary for Mental Health and Substance Use, the ACCME, or the CCEPR

## **MSMS Legislative Platform & Priorities**



#### **MSMS Legislative Priorities**

Key priorities of the Michigan State Medical Society (MSMS) and its 15,000 physician and medical student members are as follows:

#### COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic has taken a devastating toll on the physical and mental health of Michigan citizens, as well as the economic health of our state. Additionally, many of Michigan's medical practices are trying to regroup from financial and staffing losses and increased costs to comply with regulatory mandates. By using scientific data to help inform decision-making, MSMS is committed to working collaboratively with stakeholders to end the COVID-19 pandemic, safely re-engage all economic sectors, provide efficient and equitable vaccine distribution, and ensure practice sustainability.

#### **Prior Authorization and Step Therapy Reform**

The prior authorization process diverts valuable resources away from direct patient care, can delay the start or continuation of necessary treatment, and can negatively impact patient health outcomes. Step therapy, also known as fail first, is another practice that disrupts patient care by requiring patients to try other therapies before being approved for the treatment that their doctor originally prescribed. MSMS will work closely with the Legislature, regulators, and other stakeholders on ways to reform prior authorization and step therapy processes to ensure transparency, remove unnecessary and costly care delays, and support shared decision-making.

#### Team-based Care

Patients are best served by a team-based approach to care that provides the maximum amount of choice while ensuring that they benefit from the additional training and expertise that comes from having a physician on the team. A highly functioning health care team is the best way to serve patients. MSMS will continue to promote the role of the physician as the leader of the health care team and oppose any efforts to expand allied health professionals scope of practice that may put patients at risk.

#### Telemedicine

Telemedicine has proven to be an effective care delivery method that ensures convenient and timely access to patients. Before the outbreak of COVID-19, insurers covered telemedicine visits to varying extents; however, there were often obstacles such as low reimbursement and restrictions on site of care. Although payers removed some of the regulatory and administrative barriers during the pandemic, these policies are now reverting to prepandemic times. Moving forward, payment and service parity for the use of clinically appropriate telemedicine services is critical.

#### **Health Equity**

Several events in 2020 brought to the forefront the need to prioritize advocacy addressing systemic policies and other contributing factors that deny historically marginalized groups equal and just opportunities to maximize quality of life and health outcomes. In order to improve the health of all populations, MSMS will work to advance policies that reduce disparities and improve health equity.

#### **Graduate Medical Education (GME)**

Studies repeatedly demonstrate that one of the best ways to recruit and retain physicians is via local medical schools and residency programs. GME helps fill the gap in underserved areas by providing extremely low-cost care to those most in need. Michigan has been a leader in expanding medical school class sizes to address the projected demand for physician services, it is imperative that we continue to fund GME slots to allow these future physicians to learn here in Michigan, and stay here in Michigan.

MSMS has long-standing positions and policies on numerous topics. Following is an overview of the top issues comprising the MSMS legislative and regulatory advocacy platform.

#### **Insurance and Regulatory Advocacy**

- · Ensure appropriate access to and payment for telemedicine
- · Advocate for adequate and transparent physician networks
- · Reduce unnecessary administrative costs

- · Strengthen public health infrastructure
- Support vaccine availability and oppose efforts to weaken Michigan's vaccine laws
- Improve health equity
- Ensure access to evidence-based non-opioid pain care and opioid use disorder treatment
- Reduce childhood environmental hazards
- Reduce gun violence through health screening, patient counseling and expanded access to mental health services

#### **Professional Liability**

- · Preserve existing tort reforms
- · Support higher negligence thresholds in medical liability cases
- Eliminate the lost opportunity doctrine
- Maintain the legislative intent and enforceability of all medical liability tort reforms

#### Medicaid

- · Seek funding parity with Medicare
- Seek funding sources that are fair and sustainable
- Support state funding for the Healthy Michigan Plan
- · Ensure access to physician-directed care

#### **Physician Supply and Training**

- Increase graduate medical education funding at state level
- · Minimize burden of medical school debt

#### Insurance Contracting Reform

- Limit retroactive audit timeframes
- Support adequate disclosure of fee screens
- · Support appeals process that includes independent reviews

#### Scope of Practice

- Support physician-led, team-based health care
- Support education over legislation as the means of increasing scope of practice
- Oppose independent prescriptive authority by non-physicians
- Support patient right-to-know/health professional credentials disclosure
















Hope and health in the community

The GHS Children's Intensive Crisis Stabilization Team (ICSS) provides mobile crisis stabilization services, 7 days a week between 8:00am and 7:00pm to all children, youth, and young adults (ages 0-21) who reside in Genesee County. Calls during other hours are helped by our Crisis Line mental health professionals.

#### Reasons to call GHS:

- If you feel your child/youth is in a crisis
- The child/youth may hurt themselves or others
- The child is experiencing overwhelming confusion, anger, or emotional unresponsiveness

If you aren't sure if ICSS is needed, give us a call and we can help to explore options.

#### What happens when the GHS Intensive Crisis Team is called?

The team will provide an on-site intervention with the identified child or youth, and their support system. The team's main focus will be to help assess the crisis, utilize de-escalation techniques, help the child/youth and their family or support system to help with what is needed and to help determine next steps and long-term care.

#### Other services include:

- Crisis and Safety Planning
- Referrals to needed services
- Education on resources, diagnosis and services
- Collaboration and problem solving
- \* Psychiatric consults, as needed (does not include medication review for prescription)
- \*\* Intensive Crisis Stabilization services cannot be provided to individuals who are currently residing in inpatient settings: Jail/detention centers or residential settings (i.e. child caring institutions, crisis residential, etc.).
