AREYOU ATRISKFORA HEART ATTACE

There are more than **3 million cases** of **heart disease** diagnosed in the U.S. each year.

Coronary artery disease is the "silent killer," but some warning signs are apparent. They include unusual pain in the left armpit, arm and upper chest; unexplained heartburn; and malaise, tiredness or "just not feeling right." Why be uncertain?

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"You study very hard and we work hard to teach you so that you can become a doctor who could take care of patients. Taking care of patients does not mean dying with them."

These are the words of an African medical school dean to his graduating class after the death of a doctor during an Ebola epidemic. To date about 3600 us doctors lost their lives to covid-19 in its first year. Although the death rate amongst healthcare workers from the coronavirus has decreased substantially in the second year of the pandemic, due to the precautions that are being taken and mainly due to the vaccinations, new variants of the coronavirus coming at us every few months from all directions (the Omicron variant being the main one lately), the virulence of which we don't know, as we don't know the effectiveness of the vaccine against any new mutations, we cannot predict how many colleagues we might lose in the fight against the virus. Since the beginning of the pandemic- as always - we have been leading the fight as we have done against all diseases. For us to be able to continue the fight we have to stay alive, well and healthy so that we can continue to do what we do. We can not do that unless we take all the necessary measures that we have to take to protect ourselves. Including taking these precautions with all patients with whom we come in contact It is estimated that almost 50% of patients admitted to hospitals who are positive for covid-19 present with something not related to that. Therefore it is important that we assume that every patient we encounter is infected with the virus regardless of their presentation. It is vital that we do our best to have all our patients vaccinated

In addition we have to watch and follow OSHA'S Healthcare emergency Temporary Standards (ETS) very closely. The Healthcare ETS include supplying personal protective equipment and ensuring proper usage (e.g., mandatory seal checks on respirators); screening everyone who enters the facility for COVID-19; ensuring proper ventilation; and establishing physical distancing requirements (6 feet) for unvaccinated workers. It also requires employers to give workers time off for vaccination.

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Happy New Year From GCMS

The Genesee County Medical Society had a very successful year in 2021. Although we are in the midst of a pandemic, GCMS has many things to be thankful for.

The Genesee County Medical Society experienced an increase in annual memberships for 2021. A major physicians group signed on as GCMS members. New and expired memberships were converted to active members.

A goal of GCMS was set to strengthen relationships with members and sponsors. I have travelled to several physician offices to meet with the staff. GCMS has strengthened relationships with Ascension Genesys hospital, Hurley hospital, and McLaren Flint hospital. All three of the area hospitals advertised in the Bulletin in 2021 for the first time.

GCMS hosted two successful and well attended virtual Town Hall meetings in March and September. The Town Hall meetings included discussion and voting of potential future GCMS Board members. I would encourage all GCMS members to attend future Town Hall meetings for input on selection of future board members.

The Genesee County Medical Society was very active in legislative bills introduced in Lansing. Bills that were counterproductive or detrimental for physicians were actively opposed by GCMS. GCMS had board members attend meetings in Lansing to actively oppose bills such as HB4359 (CRNA independence). GCMS has an impact on current and future bills affecting physician's practices. Quarterly legislative meetings are held with local politicians discussing bills and the impact on physicians. This is a significant advantage to doctors in Genesee County and is a major reason all active practicing physicians should become a GCMS member.

Genesee County Medical Society has been active in the community with COVID-19 vaccinations. GCMS members have organized COVID-19 vaccinations through churches and other facilities. GCMS physicians have been approved and offer COVID-19 vaccinations and boosters from their office.

In November the annual President's Ball was held at Atlas Valley Country Club in Grand Blanc. There were over 100 people in attendance at this event. GCMS has not had a President's Ball this well attended and sponsored in several years. I would like to thank Dr. Sunil Rao on an excellent year of growth in 2021 under his presidency. Dr. Khalid Ahmed is the Genesee County Medical Society newly elected president for 2022. I look forward to working closely with Dr. Ahmed for continued growth of GCMS in 2022.

Genesee County Medical Society is strong in its commitment to supporting county physicians and is financially stable. Please renew your GCMS membership for 2022 as soon as possible. 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
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

Doctors and Their Families Make a Difference — Lakshmi Tummala

The GCMS Alliance is committed to community service. It has been supporting Safehouse Emergency Shelter for women through the very important Doctors and Their Families Make a Difference project. This is an ongoing service for which we purchase the much needed clothes, shoes, towels and blankets for the women and young children who are survivors of sexual assault, domestic violence and sex trafficking, with just the clothes on their back. In addition, throughout the year, members collect personal care and children's items like toothpaste, deodorant, over-the-counter pain relievers, cold medicines, hygiene products, diapers, household cleaning products, children's books and toys. Electronic Prescribing FAQ

December 6, 2021

1. I do not currently electronically prescribe. Which software should I use?

<u>MCL 333.17754a</u> will soon require all prescribers to electronically transmit all controlled and noncontrolled substance prescriptions unless otherwise exempt under the statute (see question 3 below for exemptions).

The department does not recommend specific software. Please refer to <u>MCL 333.17754a(1) and (2)</u> for guidance on the type of software that can be used. You may also want to contact your professional association for guidance. Additionally, the Drug Enforcement Administration has <u>approved various</u> <u>entities</u> to provide the certification of electronic prescribing systems.

2. When does the electronic prescribing requirement go into effect?

The Bureau of Professional Licensing's (BPL) enforcement of the electronic prescribing standard will coincide with the <u>Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services' (CMS) enforcement schedule</u> for Part D prescription drug programs. As a result, BPL will initiate enforcement of Michigan's new electronic prescribing standard on the same date that CMS begins its electronic prescribing enforcement schedule. At this time, the CMS requirement will be enforced starting January 1, 2023, unless the enforcement date is further extended by CMS.

3. Are there any exemptions to the law?

<u>MCL 333.17754a(5)</u> provides a number of exemptions to the law. In addition, BPL will soon be accepting applications for a waiver of the electronic prescribing requirements. Listed exemptions in MCL 333.17754a(5) include:

(a) If the prescription is issued by a prescriber who is a veterinarian licensed under Article 15 of the Public Health Code.

(b) If the prescription is issued under a circumstance in which electronic transmission is not available due to a temporary technological or electrical failure.

(c) If the prescription is issued by a prescriber who has received a waiver from the department under MCL 333.17754a(7).

(d) If the prescription is issued by a prescriber who reasonably believes that electronically transmitting the prescription would make it impractical for the patient who is the subject of the prescription to obtain the prescription drug in a timely manner and that the delay would adversely affect the patient's medical condition. A prescriber who does not electronically transmit a prescription under this subdivision shall document the specific reason for his or her belief that the delay would adversely affect the patient's medical condition.

(e) If the prescription is orally prescribed under section 7333(3) or (4).

(f) If the prescription is issued by a prescriber to be dispensed outside of this state.

(g) If the prescription is issued by a prescriber who is located outside of this state to be dispensed by a pharmacy located inside of this state.

(h) If the prescription is issued and dispensed in the same health care facility and the individual for whom the prescription is issued uses the drug exclusively in the health care facility. As used in this subdivision, "health care facility" includes, but is not limited to, any of the following:

(i) A hospital.

(ii) A hospice.

(iii) A dialysis treatment clinic.

(iv) A freestanding surgical outpatient facility.

(v) A skilled nursing facility.

(vi) A long-term care facility that provides rehabilitative, restorative, or ongoing skilled nursing care to an individual who is in need of assistance with activities of daily living.

(i) If the prescription contains content that is not supported by the National Council for Prescription Drug Programs Prescriber/Pharmacist Interface SCRIPT Standard.

(j) If the prescription is for a drug for which the FDA requires the prescription to contain content that cannot be transmitted electronically.

(k) If the prescription is issued under circumstances in which the prescriber is not required to include on the prescription a name of a patient for whom the prescription is issued including, but not limited to, a prescription issued under section 5110.

(I) If the prescription is issued by a prescriber who is prescribing the drug under a research protocol.

4. Are orally prescribed prescriptions still allowed?

Pursuant to <u>MCL 333.17754a(5)</u>, an orally prescribed prescription for a controlled substance issued pursuant to <u>MCL 333.7333(3) or (4)</u> is exempt from the electronic prescribing requirement.

5. I am retired, have left active practice, or do not practice in Michigan at this time. Am I required to electronically prescribe?

<u>MCL 333.17754a</u> will soon require all prescribers, even those retired or not in active practice, to electronically transmit all controlled and non-controlled substance prescriptions unless otherwise exempt under the statute. In addition, BPL will soon be accepting applications for a waiver of the electronic prescribing requirements.

6. I do not intend to prescribe, but I wish to maintain my license. Do I need to do anything to maintain my license under this new law?

A prescriber who does not plan to prescribe is not required to take any further action under the electronic prescribing law in order to maintain their license. The law will only apply when writing prescriptions.

7. What is involved in the rulemaking process for the electronic prescribing rules?

After the filing of a Request for Rulemaking, the rule set is considered to be open. During the rule promulgation process, BPL hosts rules committee work group meetings where the public is invited to participate in the creation of the revised draft. Further, as part of the promulgation process, rules sets are sent to a public hearing where the public is encouraged to make specific comments about the draft before it is sent to the legislature for review and final promulgation.

8. I am unable to meet the electronic prescribing requirements. How do I obtain a waiver?

The administrative rules, which will include the requirements for a waiver, are currently still pending. Once the rules are in place, BPL will have a process for applying for a waiver. The form and instructions for applying for the waiver will be posted on our website, www.michigan.gov/bpl.

9. I already have an electronic prescribing system. Do I need to get a new system?

If you are already electronically prescribing, and your current system complies with the requirements in MCL 333.17754a(1) and (2), you do not need to change systems.

10. How does this affect veterinary prescriptions?

The electronic prescribing requirements do not apply to veterinarians.

11. Is a faxed prescription considered an electronic prescription?

No, a faxed prescription is not considered an electronic prescription. Electronic prescriptions must comply with the requirements in MCL 333.17754a(1) and (2).

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



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GHS Intensive Crisis Stabilization Services for Children and Young Adults





The GHS Children's Intensive Crisis Stabilization Team (ICSS) provides mobile crisis stabilization services, 7 days a week between 8:00am and 7:00pm to all children, youth, and young adults (ages 0-21) who reside in Genesee County. Calls during other hours are helped by our Crisis Line mental health professionals.

Reasons to call GHS:

- If you feel your child/youth is in a crisis
- The child/youth may hurt themselves or others
- The child is experiencing overwhelming confusion, anger, or emotional unresponsiveness

If you aren't sure if ICSS is needed, give us a call and we can help to explore options.

What happens when the GHS Intensive Crisis Team is called?

The team will provide an on-site intervention with the identified child or youth, and their support system. The team's main focus will be to help assess the crisis, utilize de-escalation techniques, help the child/youth and their family or support system to help with what is needed and to help determine next steps and long-term care.

Other services include:

- · Crisis and Safety Planning
- · Referrals to needed services
- · Education on resources, diagnosis and services
- · Collaboration and problem solving

* Psychiatric consults, as needed (does not include medication review for prescription)

** Intensive Crisis Stabilization services cannot be provided to individuals who are currently residing in inpatient settings: Jail/detention centers or residential settings (i.e. child caring institutions, crisis residential, etc.).


